Taylor Bogenschuetz of Elkhart Lake said she was entertained when Dr. Angelika Henke made her classmate's hair and her principal's hair stand up through the use of a 400,000-volt Van de Graaf

generator.
"It was fun to see the hair go said Bogenschuetz, 13, an eighth-grade student at Lake Coun-try Academy, 4101 Technology Principal Carla Koepp de-

"I didn't feel anything, not even embarrassment," Koepp said. "You could feel the hair on your arms stand up but you couldn't feel anything on the hair on your head."

Andrew Grose of the Town of Sheboygan liked it when Henke used a leaf blower to make a 10.

"You would never think someone would take out a Black & Decker to blow something in the air," said Grose, 10, a fifth-grader at the school. "It was truly amaz-

Henke moved to Sheboygan from Germany six weeks ago and opened an office at Lake Country Academy where she operates Ele mentastic

"The kids actually do all of this,"
Henke said. "It's chemistry, it's biology, it's physics, it's technology
– it touches everything."

Students in the workshops will meet once a week after school for eight weeks, Henke said. The experiments involve household chemicals and other things found in the home. The cost per child is \$75 for

an eight-week workshop.

Among the experiments she did Allong the experiments she did for Lake Country Academy stu-dents, Henke made an egg fit into a flask that had a neck smaller than the egg. One way she did that was by pouring hot water in the flask, then dumping the water out and placing the egg on top of the flask so that it slid into the flask. The hot water heated the air inside the flask and putting the egg on top of the opening created vacuum

that sucked the egg into the flask. Koepp said the school is looking

forward to working with Henke.
"I think her energy excites the kids," Koepp said. "I think what she has to offer with her background is a fantastic enhancement to science

Henke also will improve the science program at Lake Country Academy, Koepp said.

"She's got a personality that's adaptable to any age from little ones on up through the adults," Koepp said.
